REST IN THE PEACE OF CHRIST

The Kingdom of God is at Hand! MARK 1:12-15

On the first Sunday of Lent, the Gospel reading in each Lectionary cycle is about Jesus' temptation in the desert. This event in the life of Jesus is reported in each of the Synoptic Gospels—Matthew, Mark, and Luke—but it is not found in John's Gospel. This year we read Mark's account of this event.

Compared to the Gospels of Matthew and Luke, the details throughout Mark's narrative are sparse. This is evident in Mark's account of Jesus' temptation in the desert. Mark tells us only that Jesus was led into the desert by the Spirit and that for 40 days he was tempted by Satan. The Gospels of Matthew and Luke explain that Jesus fasted while in the desert, that Satan presented him with three temptations, and that Jesus refused each one, quoting Scripture. Only the Gospels of Matthew and Mark report that angels ministered to Jesus at the end of his time in the desert.

In each of the Synoptic Gospels, the temptation of Jesus follows his baptism by John the Baptist. In Mark's Gospel, we are told that Jesus went into the desert immediately after his baptism, led by the Spirit. Jesus' public ministry in Galilee begins after his temptation in the desert. Mark's Gospel makes a connection between the arrest of John the Baptist and the beginning of Jesus' ministry. Jesus' preaching about the Kingdom of God is in continuity with the preaching of John the Baptist, but it is also something new. As Jesus announces it, the Kingdom of God is beginning; the time of the fulfillment of God's promises is here.

The fact that Jesus spent 40 days in the desert is significant. This recalls the 40 years that the Israelites wandered in the desert after being led from slavery in Egypt. The prophet Elijah also journeyed in the desert for 40days and nights, making his way to Horeb, the mountain of God, where he was also attended to by an angel of the Lord. Remembering the significance of these events, we also set aside 40 days for the season of Lent.

In Mark's Gospel, the desert marks beginning of Jesus' battle with Satan; the ultimate test will be in Jesus' final hours on the cross. In a similar way, our Lenten observances are only a beginning, a preparation for and a reinforcement of our ongoing struggle to resist the temptations we face in our lives. During Lent, we are led by the Holy Spirit to remember the vows of Baptism in which we promised to reject sin and to follow Jesus. Just as Jesus was ministered to by the angels, God also supports us in our struggle against sin and temptation. We succeed because Jesus conquered sin once and for all in his saving death on the cross.

5th GRADER WHO LOVES BEING CATHOLIC

While many 5th graders typically request toys and games for Christmas, Holy Trinity School student Dominic Auricchio surprised his family by asking for a Military Bible and a rosary blessed by Pope Francis.

Dominic said that he requested the items because he enjoys learning about religion at school and because he wants to become a priest and a military chaplain when he grows up. He also dreams of meeting Pope Francis.

"If I met him, I'd like to tell him that I want to be a priest," Dominic said. He has many questions for the Pope such as how a priest becomes a bishop, he said.

Dominic said his parents were surprised when they saw his Christmas wish list. Nonetheless, the whole family shared his excitement on Christmas morning when he received the blessed items.

On Christmas morning, Dominic joyfully unwrapped seven religious gifts: a military Bible, a crucifix featuring the Stations of the Cross, a rosary, a miraculous medal, a vial of holy water, a chalice made of wood from the Holy Land, and an Italian prayer card. The Bible, holy water, rosary beads, and crucifix came from the Vatican and were blessed by Pope Francis. Dominic brought the other items to the church, where Msgr. Thomas Nydegger, pastor of Saint Helen's Roman Catholic Church in Westfield, blessed them.

He is an altar server at Saint Helen's Roman Catholic Church in Westfield and said he enjoys helping the priest during Mass. His great devotion to the Catholic faith was emphasized by a personal apparition of the Virgin Mary in his bedroom that he described to Jersey Catholic in a recent phone interview.

In January 2023, Dominic received a serious medical diagnosis — a brain mass — detected through an MRI conducted in response to persistent headaches. Although antibiotics and migraine medication were administered, they did not provide relief to the symptoms, and the doctors informed the family that an operation would be necessary.

Every night, his mother prayed to the Blessed Mother before going to bed. One night in May, while everyone was asleep, Dominic awoke to a vision of a woman in his bedroom, who he said was the Blessed Mother, his mother said.

Dominic described the woman as "wearing blue, and with scarves on her head like they wore in the old days." The woman instructed Dominic to tell his mother "Do not worry" and "everything is going to be okay."

Dominic ran to his mother's room and told her about his vision. She followed him back to his room but saw no woman there. The next month, according to his mother Maria, the doctor informed the family that surgery would not be necessary for Dominic. A CAT scan revealed that the mass had begun to shrink on its own, without medical intervention, his mother said.

Maria said that the vision brought the entire family an immediate sense of relief.

Dominic's connection with the divine has been a consistent theme throughout his young life. At the age of four, he claimed to have heard the voice of God instructing him to become a priest. "I had a dream, and God told me He wanted me to be a priest," he said. This conviction to become a member of the clergy has remained steadfast, shaping his devout journey within the Catholic faith.

"Dominic is one of our altar servers and he is one of our best," said Msgr. Nydegger. "Dominic himself is a very, very fine young man. He serves at the altar faithfully and does it well. He is just a very good person and a fine, young parishioner."
